A play for two players only

Probably Marcel Duchamp's most mature work, <u>The Bride Stripped Bare by her</u> <u>Bachelors, Even</u> is a wedding of mental and visual concepts designed as an insoluable engine. As a work in glass in which the figures float in vague undefined space, the figures have about them a depersonalised sexless air. The male figures point at the bridal figure a whole battery of upright phallic forms whilst the female figure has an abstract and mechanical appearance , based on the shape of a chess piece.

In our work, the male figures are reduced to a wire-frame realisation of Duchamp's chocolate machine which unsuccessfully attempts to spin amd dazzle whilst the Bride is liberated from the encasement of her abstract cylindrical body to take on a truely hermaphroditic form.

The chocolate grinder has already made his move, taking two squares. The bride is capturing him, en passant.
